**UGH HALL** — Long lines for commuters may be a thing of the past at the Borough Hall station. Eight new Metrocard machines went into operation yesterday at one of the borough's busiest stations.

On an average weekday, more than 100,000 people travel through the Borough Hall station, said Deirdre Parker, spokeswoman for the New York City Transit Authority.

The new machines are located at the 5 and N and R lines will have the opportunity to skip the long lines. The advantage of eight Metrocard machines (M/M), three at the Court/Montague entrance, four at the Court Street between Court Street and Borough Place, and one at the Borough Street entrance.

The new machines are automated touch-screen machines that operate in English and Spanish as well as Italian, Russian, French and Chinese. The automated machines are similar to machines seen at LIRR stations — accept cash, ATM cards and Metrocard.

The new machine also allows a rider to obtain cards

ed for \$55, and will accept the maximum amount of \$90.

Galina Shi works in the area and is familiar with slow moving lines of the rush hour commuters. "The machines are convenient" she said. "They are easy to use — very much self-explanatory." She called the machines an excellent way to cut down on the rush hour and overcrowding in the busy station.

Paul Basso, who also works in the area welcomed the machines. "They are convenient," said Basso. "They help a lot and they will definitely help reduce the rush hour lines."

The downtown station is the fourth in the borough, after the Jay Street, Brighton Beach and Sheepshead Bay stations, where the machines have reduced lines and overcrowding, said Parker.

According to Parker, the installation of the new machines are part of the T.A.'s program that installed more than 100 of the automated machines throughout the city over the summer months. By the end of the year, said Parker, all subway stations in Brooklyn, Queens, Manhattan and the Bronx
